


PARTICIPATORY GRANT GIVING DURING COVID-19 A REVIEW, JULY 2020

Time to reflect

Camden is a borough of inequalities and COVID-19 has exasperated these inequalities. When lockdown hit in April, members of our community found themselves in vulnerable situations, and civil society lacked much of the funding it needed to carry on delivering essential services. In March we opened an appeal to raise money to support the short term needs of civil society, with the aim to support the additional demand for services and to also cover lost income. This lead to two COVID-19 emergency grant giving rounds. We were also able to continue offering our 'business as usual' grant programmes in order to carry on funding essential local grassroots organisations who do invaluable work in the community.

Despite the economic hardships being exacerbated, throughout this crisis we have seen huge community momentum. The success of our emergency appeal showed us that all sectors saw the importance of looking out for the local community. We also received many individual donations (the average amount being £100!), showing us that residents felt a sense of connection and responsibility for their borough. This time has highlighted the strength of our communities but also the huge amount of work that is still needed to reset and rebuild, and we aim to put those who might feel powerless at the centre of this process.

Put together by two volunteers, the following review is a result of a series of 12 conversations with our community of panelists, grantees and funders (businesses, local authority and individuals) about the COVID-19 emergency response. We hope that the findings are helpful to anyone who is interested in or considering using a participatory grant giving model.

COVID-19 Emergency Fund

During the COVID-19 crisis our usual grant-giving process had to adapt to the needs and limitations of the current situation. We needed to quickly raise and distribute money through our COVID-19 emergency fund to help members of the community most at need. We were overwhelmed by the response and donations from our community, resulting in us being able to offer £347,691 of grants during the crisis. During the first round we offered £150,320 to provide emergency relief to the community. The second round had more specific criteria, and we awarded £197,371 to organisations with an average income less than 200K or organisations with a track record of offering specialised services for Black, Asian, and Minority Ethnic (BAME) communities in Camden.





Business as usual

We opened all of our spring fund programmes as planned and our HS2, Future Changemakers and Kings Cross panellists continued to allocate grants during the crisis too. We decided to adapt the criteria for our 'business as usual' grants to ensure applicants were also taking into consideration the COVID-19 crisis. All together, since April, we had our busiest ever grant giving period.

Participatory grant-giving process during COVID-19

All decisions as to who were funded were made using participatory grant giving. The model is simple, decisions about where money goes in the community should be made by people living in that community and have knowledge of local issues and services. During the crisis our participatory funding process changed slightly to adapt to the current situation and enable us to move quickly to make money available.

Panel Recruitment

Staff reached out to individuals who had previously been on our panels. All these panelists had been living through the hardships caused by COVID-19 in the local area. They were already trained and experienced, which meant we were able to move quickly. Our panelists are always paid London Living Wage.

Open Fund to Applicants

The aim of the first round of funding was to provide financial support to services in Camden under threat from the COVID-19 outbreak. The criteria was loose, covering 4 key areas, to make sure the money was available to address the local need. A close deadline was set so the money could reach services quickly.

Money Awarded

The money was quickly awarded to the successful applicants. Staff made sure to keep in contact with grantees and to offer feedback to those who were unsuccessful.



Review of Applications

After the deadline, trustees delegated the decision making to the panel. The panel members came together to review the applications via video chat. They shared their opinions and decided on outcomes.

Reflect and Repeat

Camden Giving reflected on the applications and the specific needs in the area. Staff devided to continue fundraising for second round of grant giving with a more select criteria. The Future Changemakers Panel also decided to change the focus of their youth fund to COVID-19 related issues.

10 things we were told by our funders, community panels and grantees

1

They felt valued and safe during the process

Panel members have said that the staff at Camden Giving facilitated a safe online space with ground rules where they felt safe and valued.

3

Funders trust Camden Giving as experts in the community

Camden Giving has a strong reputation in the community as being experts in whats happening in the community, with a strong grass routes presence. They were willing to give up control to make sure money goes to those most at need.

5

Panelists felt empowered to continue to change their community

Members of the panel said being involved in local decisions made them feel empowered to continue to improve services in their area.

7

Good training pays off

All panel members attend a training session before sitting on the panel. Panel members reported that the training was extremely helpful in making them feel comfortable and at ease in the role.

9

Panelists were keen to support those left out of Govt. funding

Panellists wanted to make up for gaps in Government funding and made sure to prioritise those who may have fallen through the cracks.

2

Funding grassroutes organisations is essential

Funders, grantees and panel members alike expressed the importance of giving money directly to the community in a times of crisis.

4

The community knows what's best for the community

Members of our community expressed commitment to the participatory grant-making model. During COVID-19 it is even more important that we hear the voices of those who are being most affected.

6

COVID-19 has highlighted local inequalities

COVID-19 has been a moment of solidarity, but it has also shown the stark inequalities within our community and highlighted those most at risk.

8

The application process was simple and quick

Grantees expressed that the application process was simple and enabled them to explain their projects without having to answer too many questions.

10

Young people are worried about their future

The young people in our community say they are worried about what COVID-19 will mean for their future in terms of employment and services available to them.

5 ways the participatory grant giving model works differently

1

Whole community involvement

The emergency response involved input from all sectors of the community, whether it was donations, voluntary support or becoming a member of the panel.

3

Trustees deligate decision to panel

Unlike many grant makers, our trustees devolved their decision making power to a panel of Camden residents for each fund. Our panel members reflect the diversity and different experiences in the community.

2

Empowers those traditionally left out of decision making

Instead of just involving those with lots of power, the nature of our panel recruitment and outreach aims to involve those who may have not been given many opportunities in decision making.

4

Transparent, democratic decision making

At the panel meeting, panellists discuss each application and judge it against set criteria. Unsuccessful applicants are given thorough and immediate feedback.

5

Grantees feel they are judged on their local impact

Grantees expressed that the nature of participatory funding meant that instead of being judged just on their ability to complete a form, they felt like they were also being judged on their proven contribution to the local community,

5 things we have learnt during the crisis

1

Funders thought it was more essential than ever to give directly to the community

During this crisis we learnt that funders feel that participatory funding enables them to make sure they are being responsive to the actual needs in the community they operate within.

3

Demand for funding has increased

Our community panels were faced with difficult decisions and were unable to support some much needed work. As we go forward we want to work with applicants who are committed to Camden but struggling to access funding to ensure the experience is as dignified and painless as possible.

2

A strong social media presence is essential

During this time we have managed to utilise our social media account to reach out to individuals for donations and keep members of the community up to date with what we are doing. We saw a huge amount of individual donations, showing that even in hard times people were looking beyond their individual needs.

4

People with low levels of power feel increasingly powerless

Members of our community expressed that COVID-19 uncovered feelings of powerlessness and being unable to control their lives. Young people in particular felt there were fewer ways they could influence positive change.

5

Having a specific criteria is helpful

For our first COVID funding round we had a multitude of applications. We learnt that a more specific criteria is helpful where possible, as it allows the panel to channel money directly in to organisations working with those most in need.

"We'd been unsuccessful for funding the previous month and so were really close to losing all hope, but Camden Giving were really positive and encouraged me to put forward the bid! Working with Camden Giving was really speedy and the turnaround was so quick. We put in the bid and then within a couple of weeks the money was in the bank and we were able to send out tech within three days."

"The process was very straightforward and quick, I think if anything they were chasing me to say they wanted to pay the funds into our account! It was quite refreshing because there was another organisation we'd dealt with who were quite big and were just completely swamped during this time, it took them about 8 weeks to get back to us and when they did we were unsuccessful. But with Camden Giving I was notified within two or three days. It felt as though you were being judged on your impact within the borough rather than your ability to write a funding bid."


